# About the work

Sampling the City is an interdisciplinary project between Shiva Feshareki and EMPRes that incorporates sound, composition, technology, hermeneutics and architecture.

The live performance is the culmination of this project in which Shiva Feshareki uses her turntables to create a unique spatial composition live-in-the-moment at The Sheldonian. Samples collected from in and around Oxford will be incorporated with music and archive recordings from the EMPRES library. Old college choirs LPs will be morphed, expanded and contracted into tangible objects of sound that move, swirl and glide in the space. Different voices will be heard and manipulated live in improvisation, speeding them up, slowing them down, forwards and backwards to infinite effect, creating music and new perspectives out of the diverse sounds and

narratives of Oxford.

During this performance, Shiva will listen and respond to the acoustics, the energy and the architecture of The Sheldonian to form a duet between herself and the acoustic space. A cutting-edge 16 speaker ambisonic soundsystem has also been installed to generate a new form of 3D spatial audio also controlled by Shiva as she composes live. This approach is archetypal of Shiva's ambisonic live turntablism in which she fearlessly warps time and space through the boundless possibility of her turntables, interconnecting society, geography, and history into musical compositions that broaden perspectives.



Performing with Shiva will be Daniel Hulme on modular synthesizer. Daniel will weave together field recordings and narratives from the city of Oxford with the crackling raw electrical energy of the analogue synthesizer, to form a free-improvised collage and brand-new imaginary landscape – all in quadraphonic sound – convolving with Shiva to create a unique spatial duet.

The ambisonics for this event are powered by AUDITIF (Serafino di Rosario and Mario Buoninfante)

# Shiva Feshareki

Shiva Feshareki is a British-Iranian composer, artist and turntablist, described as "the most cutting-edge expression of turntablism" and as "one of the most astonishing acts of musical alchemy" (BBC Radio 3). Over the last decade, she has been a pioneer at the leading edge of both contemporary classical and electronic music scenes.

As a self-described sonic architect, Feshareki is fascinated by the materiality of sound. Her intrepid exploration of a 360-degree sound world encompasses compositions for orchestral, solo, choral, chamber, electronic and interdisciplinary installation works. In her live electronic compositions, she masterfully contorts samples of her acoustic compositions along with peculiarities from her own sample collection, employing an array of technology from vintage analogue tape echo, vinyl turntables, CDJs, to state-of-the-art ambisonic technology to create experiences that reveal the fluid and infinite interplay between sound and the physics of space. Her acoustic and electronic compositions are therefore deeply intertwined and this hybrid approach has placed Feshareki at the

Feshareki has performed extensively across the world in concert halls, art galleries, festivals and raves, with notable appearances at BBC Proms (Royal Albert Hall), The Tanks at Tate Modern, Southbank Centre, Barcelona's Sonar Festival, the Moscow Museum of Modern Art (VAC Foundation), Casa Del Lago (Mexico), Mutek (Montreal), Hyperreality Festival of Club Culture (Vienna), Maerzmusik (Kraftwerk, Berlin) and Hellerau (European Centre for the Arts). Feshareki has also worked alongside the BBC Singers, BBC Concert Orchestra, London Sinfonietta, London Philharmonic Orchestra, London Contemporary Orchestra, Ensemble Modern, Manchester Camerata, Netherlands Chamber Choir, Vienna Radio Symphony Orchestra, Düsseldorfer Symphoniker, Haroon Mirza, Yoshi Sodeoka and Arlo Parks to name just a few.



Daniel Hulme is Electronic Music Studio Manager at the Faculty of Music, University of Oxford; where he teaches various aspects of studio practice, sound design, synthesis, computer music and other related areas. He is also one of the founders and directors of the Faculty of Music's EMPRes group. Since 2018 he has co-curated an event series in collaboration with Modern Art Oxford called 'The Art of Noises', focused on supporting experimental sound-based works.

He began experimenting with 4-track tape recorders, guitars, effects pedals and synthesisers in the early 1990s. Intrigued with the process and potential of recorded sound, and the fluidity of working within this medium, he went on to spend many years developing his craft in the UK music studio scene. He has always been fascinated in creating cybernetic networks of interacting people, processes and devices; each one listening and reacting to the other - freely improvising in response to the sounds and music happening in the studio or concert venue.

As a musician and music producer over the years he has collaborated with a diverse range of artists including Tricky, Roots Manuva, Jesse Darling and Beth Orton.



The University of Oxford's <u>Electronic Music Practice RESearch group (EMPRes)</u> aims to promote and advance research in electronic music practice at a national and international level. It will do so by working with researchers and academics from a wide range of disciplines interested in electronic music, as well as with musicians, composers, producers and other members of the music industry. It aims to function primarily as a framework to provide support for practice-based activities.

The group's approach to electronic music practice is broad and inclusive, incorporating areas such as electroacoustic music, sonic art, record production and popular music, performance with electronics, field recording, music for film and numerous other genres and styles.
